







New Safeguard study explores the socio-psychological drivers of pollinator conservation

A new Safeguard study published in the *People and Nature* journal investigates the socio-psychological factors influencing individual behaviour in favour of conservation interventions for pollinators in rural versus urban environments across three European countries: Germany, Italy and the Netherlands. Despite regional differences in socio-cultural and economic conditions, individuals from the three countries living in both rural or urban environments shared similar socio-psychological drivers to protect pollinators.




Safeguard paper reveals new findings on the floral and pollinator communities in Hungary

Safeguard study published in the journal Agriculture, Ecosystems & Environment contributes to filling in knowledge gaps about the efficiency and dynamics of wildflower plantings and their relation to pollinators in the farmland regions of East-Central Europe. Researchers investigated how landscape context, spatial configuration and age of wildflower plantings, seasonality and flower composition affect pollinator communities in Hungary.



Safeguard policy brief now available in Hungarian

The Safeguard policy brief was released in 2022 on the occasion of the 15th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the UN Convention on Biological Diversity (COP15). It aims to reach various pollinator and policy experts from around the world and foster policy dialogue and knowledge exchange on the topic of pollinator protection. Recently, partners from the Regional Centre for Information and Scientific Development and Ökológiai Kutatóközpont prepared a Hungarian version of the policy brief, making it accessible to a broader audience.

Nature Restoration Law: Still in political deadlock at the Council

The NRL is still in jeopardy and has failed to be adopted by the Council before the EU elections, with some countries forming a blocking minority, while some abstain like Austria. On 13 May, 11 environment ministers signed a letter to their counterparts to push for the adoption of the NRL by the Council. They warned that the next meeting of EU environment ministers on 17 June is the last chance to finalise the file. They also underline that not approving the legislation would send a bad signal ahead of the next Convention on Biological Diversity in Columbia later this year, and "say we are resiling from our international promises to protect our lands and seas." Hungary, taking its turn on 1 July in the rotating presidency of the Council, has stated its intention to vote against the file.

Parliamentary elections – what do results mean for pollinators and the environment?

The Far-right has gained seats in the Parliament (ECR +4 and ID +9), while the main largest political families, the European People's Party (EPP) and the Socialists and Democrats (S&D), have maintained. Renew and the Greens have lost seats (respectively -22 and -19). The new composition of the Parliament creates potentially difficult conditions to support environmental policy in the EU over the next years, but Green Deal policies will still have to be implemented.

Sustainable use of pesticides regulation (SUR)

The farmers' protests and the run up to the EU elections have been exacerbating pressures on the EU's environmental ambitions for agriculture. On February 6, Commission President Ursula Von Der Leyen announced she would propose the withdrawal of the highly debated SUR proposal at the European Parliament plenary in Strasbourg. The President justified the decision by declaring that the SUR had become "a symbol of polarisation". The withdrawal decision was published on 6 May 2024 in the EU Official Journal.

EU Commission providing exemptions on land lying fallow (CAP conditionality rules)

On 13 February, the European Commission adopted a <u>regulation</u> which grants a partial exemption for EU farmers from the conditionality rule on land lying fallow (GAEC 8 in the Common Agricultural Policy). Now, three months later, on 13 May, the Council gave final green light to the exemption, that will apply for one year until December 2024. It accommodates several requests for more flexibility, as requested by Member States to better respond to challenges facing EU farmers.

Last month, Safeguard's mission to reverse pollinator declines went beyond Europe's borders, landing at the Sino-EU symposium on pollinator monitoring in Nanchong, China. The event was held between 16 and 17 May 2024 and jointly organised by the Nanchong People's Association for Friendship with Foreign Countries and the School of Life Sciences of China West Normal University. The symposium meeting gathered ecological agriculture experts from Chinese and European universities and representatives of foreign entrepreneurs. Among the participants of the event were Safeguard experts from the University of Würzburg, the Helmholtz Center for Environmental Research, the University of Mons, and the University of Novi Sad Faculty of Sciences.


